Looking Back at 2024

Let's Celebrate Some of the Foundation's Accomplishments

As always, the Foundation staff and board started 2024 with a long list of items we wanted to accomplish — and thanks to you, we saw a number of them come to fruition.

Batting Cages & Apartment Remodel

The Foundation completed construction of batting cages for the college baseball and softball teams. Thanks to the great number of donors who helped complete the field construction with this final building. The Foundation also assisted the college by coordinating the remodel of the Silver Street Apartments. These units were modernized for student residency. This project will allow up to 140 students to live around the campus.

Scholarships & Endowments

Scholarships and endowments are always a primary focus and this year several endowments received large gifts to increase the number of scholarships they can fund.

Two new endowments were created this year to benefit trades students. One was from the Chehalis Order of the Eastern Star and the other was from Hampton Lumber. Both will begin funding scholarships in the fall of 2025.

Longtime Centralia resident Rosemarie Hartgroves also set up a scholarship to benefit first generation or new immigrant students. We appreciate those community members and alumni who choose to help a student with the financial aspect of their education. In total, through its more than 270 individual scholarships, the Foundation awarded just over \$495,000 last fall to 436 students.

Bequests

The Foundation has also been blessed with a number of donors who have designated a bequest to the Foundation. Several have indicated a gift of a percentage of their estate after their family is taken care of and some have given a bequest of their physical assets or life insurance.

In 2025, the Foundation staff and board will be working toward several significant projects this year (although more opportunities will certainly come to our attention.)

New Support for Athletes

Due to a change by the Northwest Athletic Commission (NWAC), Washington community colleges can now offer more financial support for athletes. This will allow Washington colleges to be on par with recruiting amounts offered by other states. At the Foundation, we are setting up an endowment for athletic scholarships to assist the college with this additional opportunity for athletic recruitment.

New Scholarships for Certificates

Centralia College offers a lot of scholarships and financial aid to students, but most of the scholarship offers require full-time enrollment for degree seeking students. We have a number of students who are not degree seeking, but are working toward receiving certification in a healthcare, trades, early education, or other

career-related field. These certificates will help them secure employment or gain skills to enhance their abilities at their current job. These students may need a bit of financial help to complete this goal, and this new scholarship will support their education.

CC trustee appointed to national DEI committee

CC Trustee Petrina Mullins has been appointed to the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee for the national Association for Community College Trustees. This is a one-year appointment and will include virtual meetings with other trustees from around the country. Their mission is to identify areas that need improvement and advise ACCT leadership on how to move the needle forward for people of color and others.



ECEAP expands its reach

CC's Early Learning Programs (ELP) has extended its subcontracted partnerships to include the Oakville School District and Pacific Northwest Early Learning Center (formerly Dell's Children's Center) in Centralia. ELP will offer the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program to 299 families across Lewis County and Oakville. ECEAP provides free preschool to lowincome families.



Faculty go full TILT at assessment workshop

On Dec. 9, a group of faculty members participated in a Transparency in Learning and Teaching (TILT) workshop. TILT is a set of teaching strategies that focuses on making students aware of how and why they are learning and engaging with course content in particular ways. The workshop was led by faculty from Lake Washington Institute of Technology.

Criminal Justice prof completes her doctorate

Criminal Justice professor Tionna Miller successfully defended her dissertation over the summer. Her PhD is in Criminology from the University of Arkansas of Little Rock. Her dissertation was titled, "Mental Illness Amongst Incarcerated Individuals and its Effect on Gaining Employment." The dissertation analyzes the extent to which the mental health of previously incarcerated individuals affects their employment upon release. Results from this study concluded that having a mental health diagnosis did in fact interfere with previously incarcerated individuals' access to employment.




Blazers help take Camp Victory over the top in fundraiser

When she's not helping CC students succeed, Faculty Counselor/Advisor Andrea Seabert is the director of Camp Victory, a camp for survivors of sexual abuse. In October, Andrea delivered a powerful speech about Camp Victory at the 100+ Harbor Women Who Care fundraising dinner at the Hoguiam Elks Lodge. The event gives selected charities 10 minutes to share their story with guests, who then vote for the charity they want to support with the event proceeds. Camp Victory got the most votes, winning more than \$18,000. Andrea credited CC Speech Professor Jeff McQuarrie with helping her take the top prize.



Aman Gill showcases his award-winner research

Electronics, Robotics, and Automation Professor Aman Gill received a Best Paper award for the research he presented at the American Society of Mechanical Engineers International Mechanical Engineering Conference and Exposition in Portland in November. The research was a collaboration between CC, University of Washington-Tacoma, Clemson University, and Embry Riddle Aeronautical University and sought to compare alignment of vision-based Al with human image recognition systems. Competition was tough, with other winners hailing from University of California Berkeley, Texas Technical University, University of Stuttgart (Germany), National Taiwan University, and State University of Campinas (Brazil).



Fail rate analysis leads to meaningful changes in Biology 170

Professor Kelsea Jewell (biology and nutrition) is one of three faculty members who completed a research project as part of the college's assessment efforts. She analyzed student pass/fail information for fall 2015-spring 2022 for her human biology (BIOL&170) course with the goal of reducing the fail rate to 10 percent or less. For that period, her average quarterly fail rate was 14.7 ±4.2 percent. "After testing many factors, including class size, class modality, textbook type, and exam type, I found that by splitting my exams into combined online and in-person formats I managed to have the greatest reduction in my student failure rate," she explained, adding she used the data to significantly change how she offers tests. "Last year was my first trying this new exam format, and I was able to achieve my goal of a lowered failure rate (6.6 percent over combined fall/winter/spring) while being satisfied that I am still maintaining academic rigor." Stay tuned to future Briefs to learn about the other two faculty research projects.

New virology book features CC professor

Dr. Kelsea Jewell, professor of biology and nutrition, co-authored a chapter in a newly-published book on methods and protocols for poxviruses. The book is Vaccinia, Mpox, and Other Poxviruses: Methods and Protocols. Dr. Jewell is co-author of chapter 16. "The audience is professional and academic research scientists (PhD, DVM, or MD) working in the area of virology, and graduate students in those labs," Dr. Jewell ex-plained. "The types of viruses are used primarily in medical research, but the techniques could be more broadly applied to what gets called 'general' research for anyone interested in questions dealing with viral evolution. It's a reference book more than a teaching text, although it could be used in a doctoral-level program. Think of it like a gourmet cook book!"

TRIO TS receives 2024-25 grant award

TRIO TS received its Grant Award Notification for 2024-25. Funding will remain at a flat level of \$475,977 for the academic year, but this is great news when funding for many Department of Education programs/departments was expected to be reduced. TRIO TS is one of three TRIO programs offered at CC. It provides career and education planning for college-bound middle and high school students from mostly disadvantaged backgrounds.

BAS-BH faculty featured at conference

Lori Sirs, BAS-Behavioral Healthcare professor, was the keynote speaker at the National Association for Social Workers, Washington Chapter (NASW-WA) conference in Spokane in September. Her talk was titled, "Harnessing the Mind-Body Connection: Poi Spinning as Embodied Self-Care." This was the first in-person conference that NASW-WA has hosted since 2012. There were more than 200 social workers in attendance. The conference theme was Building Connections for a Socially Just Future.

00% Pass Rate Nursing Program **Achieves**

Centralia College has confirmed that 100 percent of its 2024 Nursing program graduates passed their National Council Licensure Examination on their first attempt. All 24 program graduates are now licensed and most are already working in the medical facility of their choice.

"I could not be more proud of our faculty and students," said Jenny Bauska, CC's Director of Nursing. "We've repeatedly heard from our clinical partners that our graduates are among the very best they hire for their facilities. The fact that we had

a 100 percent first-time pass rate demonstrates that level of excellence."

Pass rates have dropped nationwide since the COVID-19 pandemic, but are starting to rebound. Centralia College had a pass rate of 71 percent in 2021-22 and 85 percent in 2022-23. Before the pandemic, CC's pass rates were typically in the low-90s.

"This is especially meaningful coming out of the dark days of Covid," added Bauska. "It was a lot of work to get here and we're over the moon!"

Employees – During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, the college employed 289 full-time and 291 part-time employees. Of the total employees, approximately 75 percent resided in the college's service district, which includes all of Lewis County and the southern portion of Thurston County.

Local Government – Included in the expenditures listed above are payments to the county and city governments of \$599,168 for services, fees, permits, street vacation and purchase, facility rental, and utilities.

Taxes – The college is exempt from state property tax. However, the college is not exempt from sales tax. When taxable items are purchased in Washington State, it must pay tax. For 2023-24, the college paid \$21,316 in use tax to the state. The college bookstore generated \$520,741.25 of taxable sales revenue, which resulted in sales tax collections of \$39,549.


